The Source of All Love

How might remembering our shared origin from Him soften division, resentment, or judgment in my heart?



The Sacred Heart of Jesus

The Furnace of Sacrificial Love

The Sacred Heart is aflame with boundless love for humanity, despite being crowned with thorns, surmounted by a cross, and pierced through its side. It shows us that the infinite charity of our Redeemer surpasses the pain of sorrow and the malice of sin.



The Sacred Heart discloses:

- ♥ The gravity of sin
- ♥ The depth of mercy
- ♥ The beauty of self-giving love

Reflection:

Am I offering my penance with gratitude and love?

Do I unite myself with Christ and receive the Holy Eucharist attentively?

Can I give mercy freely and love purely for the good of someone else?

The Immaculate Heart of Mary

Faithful and Obedient Love

Mary's heart is pure because it is wholly surrendered. Without hesitation, she cooperates completely with the will of God while quietly contemplating all things in her heart. The Immaculate Heart burns with virginal love for God, maternal love for Jesus, and tender love for the world.

Her receptive heart demonstrates:

- ♥ The power of saying "yes" to God
- ♥ A method for cultivating interior recollection
- ♥ How to know and love Jesus through her experiences

What would it look like to hold my experiences in silence rather than react immediately?

Which Marian virtue—tenderness, fidelity, purity, trust, openness—most needs to grow in me?

The Chaste Heart of Saint Joseph

Selfless and Virtuous Love



The Chaste Heart—joined to the Immaculate Heart through marriage and to the Sacred Heart through guardianship—is focused on honoring, adoring, and glorifying God. The heart of Saint Joseph loves without controlling, gives without egoism, trusts without proof, and acts without fear. His charity toward the divine ignites his heart, illuminating the Church and the whole world. When clouded by temptation and sin, his Chaste Heart offers us clarity, strength, and protection.

Saint Joseph's humble heart shows us that:

- ♥ Guarding our human dignity preserves us from impurity and spiritual ills
- ♥ Chastity promotes command over our passions and freedom from possessiveness
- ♥ Humility in silent obedience, hidden service, and daily labor are noticed and rewarded by God

Are my actions and relationships directed outward or motivated by my selfish desires?

Do I cherish purity of body, thought, and intention?

How can I treat my work and responsibilities as a vocation?
